

Father Bill's Weekly Message

HOW SHOULD A CATHOLIC VOTE?

One of my History teachers at John Carroll, Mrs. Bailey, used to tell us, "No Vote, No Gripe." She meant that if a person failed to vote in an election, he or she had no right to complain about the results. They also had no right to complain about the government. It is also possible, since none of the students in her class were old enough to vote, she was telling us to shut up!

One of the practices that is part of the electoral process in the United States is the secret ballot. No one has the right to know how a particular United States citizen voted. The information belongs to the voter to keep secret or make public. The demonization of different political factions by other factions should help a reasonable person understand the wisdom of this practice.

There is a set of three values that it would be wise for a Catholic to consider when voting. Policies have consequences; intended and unintended. These values are Gospel values. If they are promoted, they will help a society reflect the mind of Jesus Christ.

The Right to Life: If a person loses the right to life, they lose all other rights as well. Any other right guaranteed by the Constitution cannot be exercised if the right to life is taken away. All life comes from God. Catholics are supposed to defend the dignity of human life. Abortion, euthanasia, capital punishment, and any medical experimentation that includes the destruction of one human life to benefit another, are considered immoral by the Catholic Church.

Protection of the Vulnerable: The poor, the sick, the handicapped, immigrants and other vulnerable populations should be protected rather than exploited by the government. It is the duty of the powerful to defend the weak. As Catholics, we should ask ourselves what effect a particular law will have on vulnerable populations.

The Free Exercise of Religion: Religion is the practice of one's faith. It is personal, but not private. Citizen's have the right to express their religious beliefs through the way they live. No one religion is supposed to be promoted or suppressed. Catholics may promote catholic values, but they should not suppress the values of other religions.



Statement from Bishop Steven Raica concerning remarks attributed to Pope Francis on Civil Unions

I have heard the media reports about statements allegedly made by Pope Francis in a recent documentary in Italy. I have not seen the documentary, heard the questions that were asked of the Holy Father, or been able to verify whether his responses were accurately conveyed in their proper context. In any case, it appears, as the matter comes into greater focus, that he was in no way aiming to change Church teaching about human sexuality and marriage, but instead was offering his prudential judgment on matters of public policy concerning those who seek same-sex civil unions. Furthermore, the Pope's previous statements on this issue make clear that he in no way regards civil unions as the equivalent of marriage, which ought to be privileged in society, since it is the only institution essentially ordered to the procreation and education of children.

Here in the Diocese of Birmingham, we remain committed to promoting the Church's beautiful teachings on marriage, family, and sexuality, as well as insisting that all people be shown respect and compassion. As we await possible clarification or further elucidation from the Vatican on the pronouncements attributed to the Holy Father, let us remember to keep him and his important mission in our daily prayers.

Established in 1969 under the patronage of St. Paul, the Roman Catholic Diocese of Birmingham in Alabama is missionary in nature. As Church, its ministries and outreach encompass families, parishes, schools, associations, and a myriad of programs. The diocese is spread through 39 counties over a geographic area of 28,092 square miles in the northern part of Alabama. The Diocese of Birmingham is divided into seven deaneries with 56 parishes and 19 mission churches serving 104,837 Catholics. As a mission diocese, Catholics in the diocese represent only 3% of the general population. The diocese has one cathedral, the Cathedral of St. Paul, located in downtown Birmingham. The Office of the Bishop is located at the Chancery building, also in downtown Birmingham.
