Father Bill's Weekly Message

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT: JOY

The Third Sunday of Advent is traditionally called, "Gaudete Sunday", from the Latin word for "rejoice". The entrance antiphon for Mass that day comes from Philippians 4, 4-5: "Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again: rejoice. Your kindness should be known to all. The Lord is near." The rose-colored candle is lit on the Advent wreath and rose-colored vestments may be worn.

Joy is something more profound than happiness. If you go on vacation, you experience happiness, until you return to work. If your team wins, you experience happiness, until the next game. Happiness is temporary because it is based on outside circumstances. When those circumstances change, happiness may evaporate.

As the passage from Philippians tells us, joy comes from the belief that the Lord is near. Whatever circumstances we may be living under at present, we know we are loved by God and, therefore, God will protect us. We live "under God's wings" as Psalm 91 says. Joy is the result of God's nearness.

Advent is a penitential season. Though God is near us, we are not always near God. God is always present to us, but we are sometimes absent from God. We have our times of public and personal prayer, but what about the rest of the day? We expect God to be present when we are ready to meet Him. Are we ready to meet God as He reveals Himself to us today? Matthew Chapter 25 tells us that we encounter God in the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the stranger, the sick, and the imprisoned. God is revealing Himself to us more often than just when we want Him to. Are we present to God who is always present to us?

The more we are aware of God's nearness, the more we will experience joy. No person or circumstance will be able to take that joy away from us.

ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS WITH THOMAS MERTON

homas Merton, OCSO, was a Trappist monk, hermit, peace activist, poet, retreat leader, spiritual writer, and a charismatic religious figure. Born in France in 1915 to a father from New Zealand and an American mother, Merton was baptized in the Church of England, converting to Catholicism in 1938 while he was a student at Columbia University in New York. In 1941, he entered the Trappist monastery of Our Lady of Gethsemani in Kentucky. Ordained a priest in 1949, Fr. Merton wrote more than sixty books.

In the classic epilogue to his journal *The Sign of Jonas* (1953), Fr. Merton invites us to accompany him

within the confines of the abbey in Kentucky. When we enter the choir novitiate with Merton, he's suddenly haunted by his early days as a convert to Catholicism and to "the freezing tough winter when I first received the habit and always had a cold, the smell of frozen straw in the dormitory under the chapel, and the deep, unexpected ecstasy of

Christmas—that first Christmas when you have nothing left in the world but God!"

On December 10, 1968, Fr. Thomas Merton died unexpectedly at age fifty-three while attending a conference on monastic life in Bangkok, Thailand. Shortly before Christmas 1968, his body was returned for burial behind the abbey church in Kentucky where, twenty-seven years earlier, he had desired to leave worldly matters in search for nothing but God.

Selections from some of Fr. Merton's books (identified after each reflection) are intended to inspire you during the twelve days of Christmas, starting Christmas Day. These paragraphs show Fr. Merton to be a warm, straightforward writer. In the preface to the Japanese edition of *The Seven Storey Mountain*, he states, "I don't want to speak to you as an author, or a narrator, not even a philosopher, but simply as a friend. I would like to speak to you as your alternate self.... If you listen, you will hear things that will be said that perhaps are not written in this book. And that will be coming, not from me, but from the One who lives and speaks inside both of us."

Day One | Sunrise of Praise PSALM 113:1-9

Sunrise is an event that calls forth solemn music in the very depths of humanity's nature, as if one's whole being had to attune itself to the cosmos and praise God for the new day, praise him in the name of all creatures that ever were or ever will be. I look at the rising sun and feel that now upon me falls the responsibility of seeing what all my ancestors have seen, in the Stone Age and even before it, praising God before me. Whether or not they praised him then, they must praise him now in me. When the sun rises, each one of us is summoned by the living and the dead to praise God.

CONJECTURES OF A GUILTY BYSTANDER

Day Two | Freedom to Hope PSALM 119:75-81

The one who hopes in God does not know that he is predestined to heaven. But if he perseveres in his hope and continually makes the acts of will inspired by divine grace, he will be among the predestined. That is the object of his hope, and "hope does not disappoint us" (Romans 5:5). Each act of hope is his own free act, yet it is also a gift of God. And the very essence of hope is freely to expect all the graces necessary for salvation as free gifts from God. The free will that resolves to hope in his gifts recognizes, by that very fact, that its own act of hope is also his gift: and yet it also sees that if it did not will hope, it would not let itself be moved by him. Hope is the wedding of two freedoms, human and divine, in the acceptance of a love that is at once a promise and the beginning of fulfillment.

Day Three | *Harmony of Grace* ISAIAH 49:25-26

It is beautiful to see God's grace working in people. The most beautiful thing about it is to see how the desires of the soul, inspired by God, so fit in and harmonize with grace that holy things seem natural to the soul, seem to be part of its very self. That is what God wants to create in us—that marvelous spontaneity in which his life perfectly becomes ours and our life his, and it seems inborn in us to act as his children, and to have his light shining out of our eyes.

THE SIGN OF JONAS

Day Four | Alpha and Omega EXODUS 3:13-15

Repentance is a complete renewal, a discovery, a new life, and a return to the old, to that which is before everything else that is old. But the old and the new meet in the metanoia, the inner change, that is accomplished by the hearing of God's word and the keeping of it. That which is oldest is also newest because it is the beginning. "I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end" (Revelation 22:13). The Jews were scandalized at Christ, who spoke as if he were already known to Abraham. "You are not yet fifty years old." Christ replied: "Before Abraham was, I am" (John 8:57-58). The new is within the old because it is the perennial beginning of everything and emerges from the old, transcending it, having no part in it, eternally renewing its own life. The gospel is handed down from generation to generation, but it must reach each one of us brand new or not at all.

CONJECTURES OF A GUILTY BYSTANDER

Day Five | Yoke of Sin

Despair is not permitted to the meek, the humble, the afflicted, the ones famished for justice, the merciful, the clean of heart, and the peacemakers. Each beatitude hopes against hope, "bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things" (1 Corinthians 13:7). The beatitudes are simply aspects of love. They refuse to despair of the world and abandon it to a supposedly evil fate which it has brought upon itself. Instead, like Christ himself, the Christian takes upon his own shoulders the yoke of the Savior, meek and humble of heart. This yoke is the burden of the world's sin with all its confusions and all its problems. These sins, confusions, and problems are our very own. We do not disown them.

PASSION FOR PEACE

Day Six | *Hope and Imagination* PROVERBS 3:5-10

We are not perfectly free until we live in pure hope. For when our hope is pure, it no longer trusts exclusively in human and visible means nor rests in any visible end. He who hopes in God trusts God, whom he never sees, to bring him to the possession of things that are beyond imagination.

NO MAN IS AN ISLAND

Day Seven | Wise and Foolish

MATTHEW 25:1-13

The virgins in the Parable of the Ten Bridesmaids are equally divided. Of the ten, five are wise, five are foolish. One sometimes wonders whether, in actual fact, the foolish are not far more numerous than the wise. It is all too easy to go through life with a supine and slumbering liberty that is like a lamp without oil—a lamp that does not give light when it is needed. We most need the light enkindled in our spirit by the Spirit of God when the cry goes up, "The bridegroom comes." And he comes not only at the end of time, at the *Parousia* [the Second Coming], but also at unpredictable moments in our lives—moments of crisis, when we are providentially summoned to surpass ourselves and press onward to the fulfillment of our own personal destiny.

THE NEW MAN

Day Eight | Mary's Poverty LUKE 2:8-11, 13-18

It is most fitting to talk about [Mary] as a Queen and to act as if you knew what it meant to say she has a throne above all the angels. But this should not make anyone forget that her highest privilege is her poverty, and her greatest glory is that she is most hidden, and the source of all her power is that she is as nothing in the presence of Christ, of God. It is because she is, of all the saints, the most perfectly poor and the most perfectly hidden, the one who has absolutely nothing whatever that she attempts to possess as her own, that she can most fully communicate to the rest of us the grace of the infinitely selfless God. And we will most truly possess him when we have emptied ourselves and become as poor and hidden as she is, resembling him by resembling her.

SEEDS OF CONTEMPLATION

He who hopes in God trusts God, whom he never sees, to bring him to the possession of things that are beyond imagination.

Day Nine | Fire of Charity MATTHEW 11:25-30

The Christian life is nothing else but Christ living in us, by his Holy Spirit. It is Christ's love, sharing itself with us in charity. It is Christ in us, loving the Father, by his Spirit. It is Christ uniting us to our brothers by charity in the bond of this same Spirit. Jesus often expressed his desire to share with us the mystery of his divine life. He said he came that we might have life and have it more abundantly (John 10:10). He came to cast that life of charity like fire upon the earth, and he longed to see it enkindled.

THE LIVING BREAD

Day Ten | *Living Prudently* ROMANS 8:1-8 (JUBILEE BIBLE)

It is one thing to live in the flesh, and quite another to live according to the flesh. In the second case, one acquires that "the prudence of the flesh is enmity against God" because it makes the flesh an end in itself. But as long as we are on this earth, our vocation demands that we live spiritually while still "in the flesh." Our whole being, both body and soul, is to be spiritualized and elevated by grace. The Word who was made flesh and dwelt among us, who gave us his flesh to be our spiritual food, who sits at the right hand of God in a body full of divine glory, and who will one day raise our bodies also from the dead did not mean us to despise the body or take it lightly when he told us to deny ourselves. We must indeed control the flesh, we must "chastise [it] and bring it into subjection," but this chastisement is as much for the body's benefit as for the souls (1 Corinthians 9:27, Douay Version). For the good of the body is not found in the body alone but in the good of the whole person.

NO MAN IS AN ISLAND

Day Eleven | *Breath of Life* 1 JOHN 5:11-12, 14-15, 18-20

When God made man, he did more than command him to exist. Adam, who was to be the son of God and God's helper in the work of governing the world he had created, was mysteriously formed by God, as the Old Testament so frequently tells us, as a potter forms a vessel out of clay. "Then the Lord God formed man out of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living being" (Genesis 2:7). The life of Adam, that is to say the "breath" which was to give actuality and existence and movement to the whole person of man, had mysteriously proceeded from the intimate depths of

God's own life. Adam was created not merely as a living and moving animal who obeyed the command and will of God. He was created as a "son" of God because his life shared something of the reality of God's own breath or Spirit.

THE NEW MAN

Day Twelve | Body of Christ JOHN 6:31-33

The Being who is present is entirely invisible because, in the sacrament of the Eucharist, Christ is present only in the manner of a substance. The substance of a thing is its aptitude to be what it is, its aptitude to exist by itself, its power to be itself. It is the substance that answers our question, "What is this?" Now in this sacrament, precisely, when we ask this question of the consecrated host, we must listen to the answer of faith, which responds in the words of Christ, "This is my body." The words "my body" designate the only substantial being which is now present. There no longer remains anything of the substance of bread. We see the accidents of bread, but they contain the substance of the body of Christ.
